Helping Hands from Rutgers to Malawi

hat does success look like? That's a question I asked myself a lot while I was in Malawi for three months in 2008. Going straight from one of the richest countries in the world to one of the poorest, it


was easy to focus on the things that were missing-paved roads, reliable electricity, soap in one of the hospitals visited in the capital. It took a lot more effort and a gentle nudge in the right direction from Dr. Martha Sommers, a Presby-

terian (PC U.S.A.) medical missionary who lives in Malawi and visited Rutgers in 2007, for me to see what was already there.


Nowadays when I think about success in Malawi, I think of 9-year old Miriam (pictured above). A few days before I arrived at Embangweni Mission Hospital, which is located in a rural part of northern Malawi, Miriam was brought to

the hospital in terrible pain with severe burns across her abdomen. Since Malawi is in the southern hemisphere, it was winter there, and Miriam had gotten too close to an open cooking fire in an effort to keep herself warm. Her

There was some pain medication available but not a lot. Sometimes Miriam whimpered plaintively. It was tough to watch and to listen to.

But then, gradually, the crying stopped. Miriam started to smile. And by the time I left Embangweni she was laughing and joking with both her mother and the nurses and ward maids. Her burns were healing.

Miriam ended up spending six weeks in the hospital. Six weeks in which the nursing staff made sure her open wounds never became infected.

Six weeks in which the clinical officers gave her the very best care available in a poor rural community at the end of a dirt road many miles from the country's main paved highway.

So nowadays, when I think about what success looks like in Malawi, I see Miriam and hear her laughing. Her severe abdominal burns healed and she was able to rejoin her family and go back to school. And I think about many other successes that the staff at Embangweni Mission Hospital have accomplished—in fighting malaria, measles and malnutrition and in making sure childbirth is not a death sentence for the mothers.

And I am thankful that Rutgers was able to play a part in Miriam's successful treatment. In 2007, Rutgers, through the Benevolence Committee, sent \$5,000 to PC (U.S.A.) to help support the highly dedicated but not wellpaid nurses at Embangweni Mission Hospital. In 2008, we were able to increase that amount to \$6,000. I can assure you the money is well spent. ω

She began her teaching career in high school, as an instructor in Mommy-and-Me dance classes and creative movement for older toddlers at a studio she helped run in Hawaii. 2009 began with a blast of artic temperatures and the Inauguration of a new President. As we hold hope in our hearts for the rest of 2009 let's take a moment to review what the Session has been up to. Here is a summary in brief.

- 1. The Session endorsed two Overtures to the 218th General Assembly. The first, an overture to Delete G-6.0106b from the Book of Order and Provide a New Authoritative Interpretation. The second, an overture to Restore the Heidelberg Catechism to Its Historic Form, removing, among other things, the phrase "homosexual perversion" which is not found in the original text.
- 2. After due examination (written and oral), the Session voted to receive into membership Anne "Kristin" Collins, Haley Fulop, Elliott Idoff, Susan Jeffers, Stacy Kim, Jennifer Nunes, Kyle Okimoto, John "Newt" Pate and Robert Russo by reaffirmation of faith; William V. Falk by letter of transfer; and Isabelle Christine Gale and DeYan Rebecca Jervis McCarthy by profession of faith. We also received Julia Lucie Spencer (daughter of Nicole Byrns & Lloyd Spencer) as new members into the Body of Christ through baptism. A warm welcome one and all.
- 3. After long and lengthy discussions on balancing the needs of the church in maintaining the facilities for mission and expanding the church's outward mission through benevolence support, a motion passed to proceed with the repair of masonry due to water damage and installation of double pane glass on damaged windows (providing an approximate 8% reduction in energy costs annually over the live of the windows), which is now nearing completion.
- 4. After a year of hard work by the Mission Review Steering Committee, the Session approved the Mission Review Report, as presented by the committee, with grateful thanks. The Mission Review Report was subsequently approved by the Presbytery of New York City's Committee on Ministry. A link to the report was placed on Rutgers'

5. A special offering was organized and collected by the Sunday School children and Deacon Sheila Smith to purchase a bicycle through World Bicycle Relief (<u>www.worldbicvclerelief.org</u>) which provides bicycles to children and adults in impoverished areas around the world where the primary mode of transportation is on bicycles.

6. The Reverend Dr. Tom

- Driver, on behalf of the Peace & Social Justice Network presented a proposal for Rutgers to endorse a statement by the National Religious Campaign Against Torture (NRCAT) and to become a participating member in the NRCAT and its struggle against torture. The motion passed. A motion also passed to allow the flying of a "No to Torture" banner to fly in conjunction with Torture Awareness month. The Session later endorsed a Declaration of Principles for a Presidential Executive Order on Prisoner Treatment, Torture and Cruelty as prepared by the NRCAT to be presented to President Barack H. Obama. Statement and further information can be found on the NRCAT's website at www.nrcat.org.
- 7. The Session called a Congregational Meeting, in which the Congregational Nominating Committee presented a slate of 9 nominees to the Pastoral Nominating Committee (PNC). The nominees were approved by the congregation and the committee has been hard at work, first preparing the Church Information Form (CIF), which was approved by both the Session and the Presbytery of New York's Committee on Ministry, and then reviewing more than 100 Pastoral Information Forms (PIFs).
- 8. The Session approved the use of the Sanctuary to host a rally organized by the West Side Peace Action and co-sponsored various social justice events with other organizations.
- 9. Session enthusiastically approved a motion to extend the contract with the Reverend David D. Prince, as Interim Pastor, for an additional year,

ending September 24, 2009, subject to termination with 90 days notice (in light of the work of the PNC).

- 10. To help foster civic responsibility, the Session voted to renew a contract with the Board of Elections where Rutgers Church once again acted as a voting site during the presidential election year.
- 11. The Session moved to replace the chairs in the narthex, which were badly stained and on the verge of collapse, with Kathryn style chairs, which more closely resembled the existing chairs with a Falling Leaves pattern of upholstery.
- 12. A Congregational Meeting was called by the Session, where the congregation joined with the Reverend Cheryl Pyrch in requesting that the Committee on Ministry dissolve the relationship between Chervl and Rutgers, in order for Chervl to accept a solo pastorate position at Summit Presbyterian Church in the city of Philadelphia. Cheryl was honored with a luncheon reception where she was thanked for her many years of faithful service to Rutgers church and community.
- 13. The Session approved a recommendation by the Personnel Committee to employ Jacqui Van Vliet as Interim Director of Educational Minis-
- 14. After an extensive interview, review and questioning based of the completed Application for Enrollment as an Inquire (Form 1), a motion unanimously passed to approve member Douglas Grace as an Inquire in the Presbytery of New York City and under the care of Session, the first, in a long series of steps toward ordination. Douglas was later approved by the Presbytery as an Inquirer at its regularly stated meeting.

Well, maybe it wasn't so brief, but as you can gather, the Session has been hard at work. We are humbled and honored to be able to be of service to such a diverse and dynamic congregation and to be able to call it our spiritual home. ω


